ODIES lying in mass graves and along the street, some tortured, some dismembered, some having been tied up and beaten to death. These are not the scenes of a World

War II documentary or horror movie; rather, they are the remnants of Russia's invasion of the Ukrainian city of Bucha – with the full toll of the carnage still to be revealed.

During his visit to the region on Tuesday, Ukrainian President Volo-dymyr Zelenskyy described what happened in Bucha as genocide. Russia, whose troops have retreated from the city, is still denying the widespread deaths even took place.

The distressing scenes provide a glimpse into the unthinkable violence that has befallen countless peaceful civilians since Russia's invasion of Ukraine began in late February. Rus-sia's continued denials of any war crimes and manipulation of facts through state-controlled media show there is little remorse or plans to scale

The shameless propaganda, threat of Ukrainian labour camps and now evidence of widespread war crimes echo dark periods in history that most would have assumed would not have been revisited in our lifetime. And, while world leaders are uniting in their horror at what is happening in Ukraine, it is distressingly evident that the world's condemnation and sanctions are not going to be enough to halt Vladimir Putin's reign of terror.

WHILE more than 4000 Geelong residents get steamed up about a gas terminal not needed or wanted ("Bay gas terminal opposition gathers steam", GA 1/4), Viva spokesmen continue to play games with the truth.

While they note they've "set out emissions created by implementing this facility" this setting out failed to include the biggest single source of pollution transporting the LNG in tankers to Geelong.

They also say "there are plans to offset emissions, so it's a genuine zero-emissions project", and yet just last week the former head of the Emissions Reduction Assurance Committee went public about industry's current abuse of the carbon credit system, alleging "what is occurring is a fraud on the environment".

Finally, to claim the project "would play a critical role in meeting Victoria's gas shortage assumes we can't swap out of gas with haste - as indeed those in Europe are doing as Russia threatens world security.
